Pastor's Report 2024

Dear Friends in Christ,

May I quote a title of a German poem from Johann Wolfgang von Goethe, a famous 18th century writer whom Beethoven quoted in a cantata and Mendelsohn wrote an overture, entitled "Calm Sea and Prosperous Voyage". A case can be made for our congregations in Bainbridge and East Guilford having a calm sea whereupon we have sailed in 2024. It has not been without some winds as without wind, a sailing ship goes nowhere. No storms, but no doldrum calms either.

Our congregations have kept an even keel for the year with committees, volunteers, and events operating as usual- may I say almost on autopilot. It takes a concerted and steady effort to make the ministry of churches move with direction, purpose and coordination; we have done these admirably well. Our sessions and leaders look for opportunities to show someone that we care and do they ever succeed!

Worship takes planning and execution. Your Spiritual Nurture Committee chooses hymns, plans liturgies, prepares bulletins (some mailed out), creates power point slides, runs electronic distribution of same, and decorates the sanctuaries/sets up the worship space smoothly. Most are unaware of the many hours each week behind the scenes by a cadre of volunteers, musicians, readers, and ushers that it takes for public worship to be orderly and well-done week after week. It is exemplary when you do not think about all the details as they come together. Thank God for the

dedicated people who pitch in and make this happen with a steady organization and choreography that goes just out of view.

Administration is another behind-the-scenes activity which takes a steady hand, know-how, and anticipation to make things move in an orderly way. Clerks of Session and secretaries, treasurers and financial secretaries, elders and session members, and those knowledgeable in electronic communication make church administration look easy; may I assure you, it is not by a long stretch. Thank God for these skilled members who dedicate their time to the congregational effort while keeping eyes on the Presbyterial and Churchwide scenes too.

Our service to the community is perhaps our most obvious attribute of response to the Gospel in the world around us: they will know we are Christians by our love (as the popular hymn says). The Thrift Store and Blessing Box (Bainbridge and East Guilford respectively) along with donations to schools near and far (Ethiopia for example), disaster relief around the world and at home say we care and love. As are the efforts of volunteers who coordinate the Soup Kitchen, Community Food Pantry, Bainbridge Council of Churches, and everyday requests for assistance from people in need. All of this takes energy, skill, time, and resources and we do it all with cheerfulness as our congregations are putting our faith out there beyond the walls of our buildings. All the volunteers who make this happen (you know who you are) do it without fanfare and spotlights. The Lord is served by what we do in response here and now. The Sermon on the Mount has a line which repeats, "God sees in secret..." (Matthew 6).

The Joint Mission Committee (in a separate report) have again challenged us and the wider community to engage in concrete actions to benefit a larger circle of people than those on our roster of members. They urge as many as have courage to step forward and learn new skills as they invite all to practice those already well honed.

Chair Yoga, which usually gets no press, is another modern way we say that our bodies matter and invite the community to this flexible event. Community Christmas dinner at East Guilford and the sponsoring family, open the church up for interaction and hospitality. Several times a year, we open our buildings to outside groups for use. I know of some congregations which worship on Sundays and then close until next Sunday: that's <u>definitely not us!</u> For all the activities of which I write I also ask for forgiveness for not listing all due to space and my memory.

Both congregations are working on the feasibility of merging ministries and to that end, both sessions are diligently working to analyze the costs and favorability therein. Bold and careful, thorough as well as faithful, we work to see what God has in store for us through 2025.

Finally, on a personal note, I thank you all for your caring for me emotionally, spiritually, and materially. It is in that mutuality that we thrive, good times and stressful ones alike. May God keep you faithful to your calling in the Gospel life.

Earth Care Report

Earth Care Sunday was celebrated at the East Guilford church on May 5, 2024 during worship followed by a meal. This was the church's 14th year of certification as an Earth Care Congregation.

- The focus was on Plastic: Eliminating Single Use Plastic. A video on single use plastic was shown during the service. Ken based the sermon on the Abundant Life portion in the Plastic Jesus pdf.
- Communion: to eliminate single use plastic the silver communion set of cups from 1910 were used.
- A meal followed worship with a Cinco de Mayo theme; it was a Mexican meal with a tacos and salad bar.
- It was requested that participants not use plastic wrap or plastic dishes or plastic bags. Everyone brought their own washable table service including cups and utensils and the tables were set with fabric tablecloths and cloth napkins.
- A bulletin board on Plastics was put up in the fellowship hall.
- An article was submitted to the local paper the week of April 22nd announcing our 14th year as Earth Care Congregation and inviting the public to the worship service and meal.
- A quiz for plastic in our lives that can be answered "sometimes, always and never" was put in the bulletin each month.

- Replaced all batteries in thermostats, clocks, etc
- The thermostat in the dining room stopped working, replaced it with a newer model same as the one in the sanctuary

Joint Mission Report

The Joint Mission Committee of Bainbridge and East Guilford met periodically through the year to evaluate the work of 2023 and plan the outreach of our 2nd Annual Health Fair. With one year under our belts, the work was a bit easier organizational, but still required many, many person hours to contact health providers, politicians, advertise, and follow up with evaluation.

We value the work of so many dedicated people who genuinely care about helping people of our service area gain access to health care. Our churches realize that this work is somewhat different from what we traditionally have done; such is the discomfort of the 21st century and its shifted realities. What we have done has caught the eye of our Presbytery and the Lead Presbyter, Rev. Dr. Greg Garis, who for the second year in a row, had come to video and interview people and groups. His edited video incorporated clips from last year's fair and this year's too. Print media, electronic media, and broadcast media (WCDO radio) were used to get the word out. Meeting with the Chamber of Commerce yielded good contacts and press.

Unfortunately, the weather did not cooperate fair day and communication among the various flea market groups was uneven, so many stayed away. However, networking among the providers was substantial. The End-of-Life presentation held in the Bainbridge sanctuary was well received, with copious information, connections, and question-and-answer time beneficial (a video recording of this was made also).

Evaluating the work of the committee and its programming closed out our service year in October. We have determined to begin again in the new year. One anecdote encapsulates the work of the committee. Ed Gorton and Pastor Ken set up a meeting with State Assemblyman Joe Angelino and we secured a donation of a first-class Port-a-Potty for the health fair. The assemblyman did not know that we were organizing to such an extent, and he wanted in, a bonus from a scheduled half hour meeting which extended to over an hour-and-a-half. In the next week, we were contacted by Mr. Angelino to see if we could gather the local town supervisors to discuss solutions to problematic access to transportation for medical appointments. That will be grist for the new year's mill!

Blessing Box Report

The Blessing Box is filled three times a week and it is always empty, it's being used.
